

He wanted to ask Grandpa what the meeting was for, but seeing the large crowd of animals, he decided to stay quiet.




An old camel stood up and walked forward. She spoke slowly but loudly.

More Information

In addition to the animals mentioned in the book, the Prophet also kept the following animals. Some of them are alluded to in the story, but their names were not mentioned.

- 1. **Horses:** The scholars agree on the names of seven of the Prophet's horses. Their names were Sakb, Luḥaif, Lizāz, Sabḥah, Zarib, Murtajiz, and Ward. The Prophet rode on Sakb in the battle of Uhud.
- 2. **Mules:** The Prophet aw owned three mules, Duldul, Fiḍḍah, and Ilyah. All three of them were gifts from various rulers to the Prophet a. Duldul was distinguished because after the Prophet Ali (RA), Hasan (RA), and Husain (RA) rode on him as well.

Suggested Activities

- 1. Older children who can read and write can choose one of the animals that are mentioned in the book and prepare a presentation about that animal. What are the different breeds, temperaments, needs, etc. of the animal?
- 2. Teachers or parents can start a conversation with children about the concept of sunnah. How can we follow the example of the Prophet in the way we treat others, humans and animals, caring for the environment, decreasing waste?
- 3. Make a list of all the things that Thunder learned on his trip with his grandfather. This can be verbal or written. For example, he learned to make dua when you need help and to look for solutions to a problem. He also learned how being connected to the Prophet makes us special.
- 4. If easily available, the children may try a few sips of goat milk.
- 5. This book can also be read before a field trip to a farm or petting zoo. It will help the children to connect to the animals in a different way, realizing that these kinds of animals were a part of the life of our Beloved Prophet.
- 6. The children can make outlines of their own feet and paint them or decorate them since Grandpa and Thunder were following hoofprints.
